## Limestone Pavement

A special and protected landscape. Gaze across plateaus of weathered limestone, where within its cracks or grykes (deep enlarged joints) ferns and rare, shade-loving plants nestle.

## Norber Boulders

Marvel at the boulders, perched on their plinths of limestone, standing sentinel over a rugged and desolate landscape of limestone.

## Ribblehead Viaduct

The best railway viaduct in the country, Ribblehead Viaduct is a feat of Victorian engineering, with 24 arches, standing 104 feet (32m) above ground, 440 yards (402m) long. No need to be a railway enthusiast to marvel at this impressive structure.

## Hull Pot

Peer over the edge of Hull Pot, an immense crater measuring 300 feet (91.5m) in length, 60 feet (18m) wide and 60 feet (18m) deep, located at the foot of Pen-y-ghent. In very wet weather, the beck plunges over the edge in a spectacular waterfall.
